oseph is a wonderful, beautiful, child. When he was in his second year, we began to realize that he was not developing like other 1+ year olds.

An appointment with a developmental pediatrician led to a diagnosis of Peri-sylvian Syndrome. It's rare sundrome that matched up with his symptoms of: drooling, lack of speech, motor delays, and visual and hearing processing problems.


Joseph has no fear. He does not have any instinct for danger. He simply does what he sets his mind to do. whether that be climbing 15 feet up into a tree. approaching or picking up snarling animal, or running into


the street. Joseph is so quick and quiet, that he does not engage in the typical prespeech babbling. He is very difficult to keep track of and must be visually watched over.

Safety is a huge issue.



Based on Joseph's needs Brigadoon Youth and Service Dog Programs will train a dog that will alert an adult by barking, that Joseph is not where he is supposed to be. The dog will be trained to stay with Joseph at all times. Because Joseph is so quiet, it is possible for him to disappear without an adult's or the dog's knowledge. Brigadoon will train the dog to find him. Once the dog has found him, it will alert an adult to his location by barkina.

Carob Peanut Butter Crunch Balls

1/2 Cup All-natural Peanut Butter, no salt Added

1/3 Cup Honey

- 1 Cup Puffed Rice Cereal, not sugared
- 1 Cup Carob Chips (available in health-Food stores)

In a large bowl, beat the peanut butter and honey until well blended and smooth. Stir in the cereal and mix well. Use a teaspoon to shape the mixture into balls. Place the balls on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Chill until firm.

When the mixture is firm, melt the carob chips in a double broiler over low heat, stirring until melted. Pierce the balls with a fork, and dip them into the carob, completely coating each ball. Shake off the excess carob, and return the ball to the baking sheet. Place the baking sheet in the refrigerator for 1 hour or until the carob is completely hardened. Store the crunch balls in a covered container or plastic storage bag in the refrigerator. Recipe yields approximately 20 two-inch balls.

Some of our dogs have had some real breakthroughs recently. Here are some of their successes:

- It only took Chelsea, a yellow Lab, only one week to pick up and carry a crutch. Chelsea is also learning to "wave" her paw.
- Tate, a smooth Collie, learned to pick up a crutch.
- Phoenix, a German Shepherd, learned to retrieve a leash, a tennis ball, a plastic dumbbell AND bring them back the trainer.
- Bond, a smooth Collie, learned to bring his dog bowl out of the crate.
- With the help of Home Port students, Chelsea, Phoenix, and Tate learned to track (following a scent). They also practiced "run and find".

SAVE THE DATE

Several Brigadoon service dogs will graduate in a special ceremony scheduled to be held at the Sehome High School gymnasium, Sunday, October 19, 2008 at 2 PM. These dogs have successfully completed two years of specialized training and will officially join their new owners. Each dog has been trained to assist in specific ways.

The dogs received two years of training, starting with basic commands when they were barely two months old and moving on to increasingly difficult tasks. By the time the dogs are ready to graduate, they've learned to ignore all types of distractions and respond quickly to commands. They know they have a job to do and that's their priority.

Sunday's ceremony will mark the beginning of a new life for these welltrained dogs and their grateful owners.
